

# Cheating and Plagiarism

## Cheating

Cheating is copying anything from another student without the teacher's specific permission. Additionally, other examples include:

1. Possessing another student's work or notebook.
2. Letting someone borrow your work or notebook.
3. Borrowing or loaning a calculator during a quiz or test.
4. The unauthorized splitting of an assignment. You do 1-10 and your partner does 11-20 and then you "swap" answers (See Number 1 above).

## Plagiarism

"Plagiarism is taking someone else's work and acknowledging it as your own.

- If you copy material and do not put quotes or cite – this is plagiarism.
- If you have paraphrased information and have not cited the source – this is plagiarism.
- If you copy content and cite, but do not put quotes around it – this is plagiarism (because the reader thinks you paraphrased the information because there are no quotes).
- If you use another student's work as your own – this is plagiarism.
- If you have/hire someone else write your assignments – this is plagiarism."
